Dear Friends.

As previously announced, we are aiming for a gradual resumption of regular in-person worship this spring, which will have the following parameters:

 We will ask that people return to worship only after they have been fully vaccinated

• A particular service will restart only after enough worship leaders have been vaccinated

- We will follow guidelines from the state, the city of Kent, and our bishop
- Livestreaming will continue of both the 9:30 and 10:30 worship services.

Our original target was to begin this restart on Palm Sunday, March 28, but it has become apparent that there is not nearly enough vaccine to achieve the originally anticipated vaccination schedule. Although we expected that we would restart with small crowds – with most people continuing to connect via livestreaming – our particular issue is that our worship leaders cannot get vaccinated. We will keep providing updates on our worship plans.

The season of Lent begins in February, and since we are still in full pandemic restrictions, our Lenten season will look different from usual. Instead of Lenten potlucks or Wednesday Lenten programs, we will be posting a special Lenten devotional video each Wednesday online. This will include Scripture plus musical offerings by Dawn Filler and Sarah Brosvic. Each devotional video will run about 15 minutes. The series will go for six Wednesdays, starting on Feb. 24 (the week after Ash Wednesday) and ending on March 31 (the Wednesday of Holy Week). We will provide updates about this in coming weeks.

We also look forward to a special type of **Ash Wednesday** service, on **February 17.** We cannot do our normal Ash Wednesday service, but at the same time it is not really possible to do virtual ashes! So we have planned a unique approach that involves "stations worship." In stations worship, the individual worshipper moves through a series of meditative stations that are spread out through a large space. In the sanctuary, we will have six stations in different places, which will guide you through various spiritual reflections. One of the stations will have ashes – available in separate little containers – so that you can place the ashes on your own forehead along with the guidance offered at that station. There will be meditative music; and there will be clear directions for how to proceed at the sanctuary entrances. Our sanctuary will be open for this from 10:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. on Ash Wednesday, February 17, so that you can come at any time; and with people spread out through the day it should be easy to keep social distance, with only one person at each station at a time. Masks are required (we will have extra masks at the entrances). We have used stations worship in the past in our Youth Group and also at our Wednesday evening Lenten programs.

For young people, our **Youth Group**, for sixth through twelfth graders, is meeting each Sunday at 7:00 p.m.; masks are required. **Sunday School** for children continues to be provided online, with two Sunday School videos available each Sunday – one for younger children and one for older children. We are currently working on what the resumption of in-person Sunday School will look like.

Also keep in mind that our **Second Sunday** virtual gathering takes place at 11:30 a.m. on the second Sunday each month. This is a half-hour virtual fellowship time, involving three small group breakout sessions, which provide opportunity for conversation with a variety of people!

As has been the case throughout this pandemic, unusual circumstances spur creative initiatives! Within these challenging times, we seek to continue to be faithful as disciples of Jesus Christ.

Dial-a Prayer

During this season of concern over the COVID-19 pandemic, the Pastoral Care Department at UH Portage Medical Center has had to make changes to provide safe care. Their volunteer staff have not been given clearance to come back into the hospital yet; nevertheless, Chaplain Johnson has continued his rounds. They have also instituted "call-in" visits for patients requesting pastoral care when the chaplain is not here. Volunteers call patients who are able to speak on the phone. Afterhours emergencies are being handled the same way. They are encouraging anyone with pastoral care concerns at the Medical Center to reach out at this number.
