Dear Friends,

This month I will be starting a new sermon series entitled, Old Words, New Life—
transformative teachings from the Old Testament. From now until Advent, we will be
journeying through important stories in the Old Testament that bring key messages for living today.

To grow in God's Word, a further outstanding opportunity in our church is Disciple Bible Study. This fall I will be offering Disciple for the final time. It will be the 28th Disciple I study that I will have offered in my 28 years here. Whether the next pastor offers Disciple will be up to that pastor; there are other Bible studies and other good approaches. So if you ever thought about taking Disciple I, now is the time! The class will be offered on Monday nights from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m., starting on August 8 and ending before Memorial Day next spring (with several break times in the sequence). Note that on August 8 the class will be a one-hour orientation and will commence at 8:00, right after the Goodyear Band concert that we are hosting that night. See the article in this newsletter for a full description of the Disciple experience.

We are also pleased to offer Disciple III this fall. This is an in-depth study of the prophets (and the Bible history corresponding to them) and the New Testament letters of Paul. It is open to anyone who has taken Disciple I (you do not need to have taken Disciple II; Disciple I is the prerequisite for all advanced Disciple courses). Disciple III will be co-led by Judith Nedel and Kiersten McMahon.

Disciple Sunday – a day when we recognize Disciple participants from the past year – will be on July 10. We will have a moment of recognition during all three worship hours, and we officially launch registration for fall classes on that day. You can register for Disciple through our website or by signing up at the church.

Youth Ministry News July 2022

As I sit in the humidity that has gripped Northeast Ohio the past two weeks, I write this newsletter having just returned from our churches 22nd trip to the mountain. On occasion I have people ask "What is the Mountain TOP experience?" or maybe "what is Mountain TOP like" The technical answer the answer to that question might sound something like this:

The camp communities depending on the camp size are broken down into several Youth Renewal Groups (YRGs), made up of six or seven youth and adults, who serve families in 13 different Tennessee counties. Whether the project includes building a porch, painting a room, or repairing a fence, the service is founded in Christian compassion. The summer staff plan and coordinate all projects as well as provide materials. All projects are considered minor home repair or maintenance projects. Adults that participate have a camper role equal to that of the youth. Each evening, the community gathers for dinner, a time of sharing about their day's experiences, and worship. They spend time examining how their experiences were an outreach of their faith, and how they met the different needs of the families they served. It is a time of worship that allows youth to reflect upon how their service that day helped them to grow in their relationship with Christ. The Mountain T.O.P. experience not only provides the opportunity to be in service to others, but more importantly, it provides the opportunity to understand "why" we are in service.

However; a more personal answer to either one of these questions is not so easily put into words, but I do know that in the 31 trips I've made to the mountain, each one has been the same and each one has been very unique. Words can't describe the feelings one gets from living for a week in the slow pace of the Southern Tennessee mountain life, smiles and waves from the mountain people, pecan pie, sweet tea,


biscuits and gravy and pulled pork sandwiches. It is equally difficult to express the feeling comes from living for a week in Christian community, putting the needs of others first and setting an example and living your life the way that Jesus intended for us to live. Equally hard to express is the closeness you feel to God while on the mountain, daily devotions and yet we still get to work by nine and nightly worship services that never seem to grow old. Family style meals that start with grace and end with prayers for the community and a work day that begins and ends in prayer give you a unique perspective on what it really means to live as a Christian.

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Disciple Bible Study

Disciple I takes participants on an overarching journey through the entire Bible in a span of 34 weeks. Through Disciple, people come to come to really know the Bible, to understand the Bible, and to see how the whole Biblical story connects together. Disciple will not simply expand your mind but will expand your spirit! It is an experience of growing in God's Word.

Disciple class participants read Bible passages each day (about a half hour's worth) and then come together once a week for a two-hour session. This fall the Disciple I class will meet on Mondays from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m., starting on August 8 with an

orientation session, and concluding on May 22, with several break periods during the course. Here are some comments from this past year's participants about their experience in Disciple:

I was hesitant about joining the class but am so glad I did. I met so many wonderful people and learned so much.

This class is unique in that anyone, regardless of previous Bible knowledge, faith journey, or age can participate in the class.

I learned a lot about things that I thought I knew.

It was amazing how much was covered in the class.

Not only did I learn of Biblical stories and history that I only had cursory knowledge of, but complicated and even frightening elements were dispelled through this very scholarly treatment of the Bible.

I feel my faith is stronger now that I have a better understanding.

Disciple has been a journey of understanding, strengthening, bonding, growing, connecting, learning, loving.

I found Disciple class participants to be quite accepting of differences.

Disciple has helped reinforce all aspects of worship. I can now relate what we learned in Disciple to the sermon, the scripture, even the hymns.

How God never gave up on his people was inspiring and reaffirmed my faith.

This class was a rich, high point of my life this year.

Disciple is designed to be of value no matter where you are in your spiritual walk or your level of Bible knowledge. The main thing that is required is a commitment to the study. Participants are asked to "covenant" to do the daily Bible readings (with the aid of an accompanying study manual) and to be in regular attendance at the weekly sessions. Disciple meets in-person, but it is also possible to attend via Zoom, either for the duration of the class or for periods of time or individual sessions. We also ask that each participant contribute \$40 toward the cost of the study manual. The class starts soon, so sign up in the atrium!
