



Advent - Christmas Worship Series



1st Sunday of Advent (December 3) - Baptism of the Lord (January 7)

Christ was born into a weary world. King Herod ruled the land with a legacy of ruthlessness. The Romans treated the people of Israel with contempt, imposing harsh taxes and land seizures that forced many into something like indentured servitude. Extreme poverty was pervasive. And yet, specifically into that weary world, Christ was born, bringing good news of great joy for all people.

As God's advent in Christ comes again to a weary world, during the seasons of Advent and Christmas this year, we'll be asking, "How does a weary world rejoice?" In worship together, we'll explore the opening chapters of the Gospel of Luke, and discover a few answers: we acknowledge our weariness, we find joy in connection, we allow ourselves to be amazed, we sing stories of hope, we make room, we root ourselves in ritual, and most importantly, we trust our belovedness. Knowing that the Christmas season often is an emotionally-charged time of year when we feel many things deeply, and sometimes all at once, we will hold space for our weariness and our joy to exist together, finding ways to rejoice in a weary world.

Changing Worship Colors

In our life together as church, we know what time it is by the colors used in our worship services. During Advent—the beginning of the new church year—either blue or purple is used. During the seasons of Christmas and Easter and other festival days, either white or gold becomes the primary color. During Lent, the penitent color of purple is used. On the Day of Pentecost, the color red reminds us of the Holy Spirit's presence as tongues of fire. And throughout Ordinary Time, green is used to remind us that we are always growing as followers of Jesus Christ.

All are welcome to join us for one or more of these conversations around books that can help us grow in this sacred work. Enchantment: Awakening Wonder in an Anxious Age by Katherine May Tuesday, December 12 at 7 pm Conference Room

Many of us feel trapped in a grind of constant change and anxiety: the noise of our news cycles and social media, our own families split along partisan lines. We feel fearful, tired, and on edge, not quite knowing why we are so wearied. For Katherine May, this low hum of fatigue and anxiety made her wonder what she was missing. Could there be a different way to relate to the world, one that would allow her to feel more rested and at ease, even amid changes? Might there be a way for all of us to move through life with curiosity and tenderness, sensitive to the beauty all around us? Enchantment invites each of us to open the door to human experience in all its complexity, and to find the goodness waiting for us there.

Jesus and the Disinherited by Howard Thurman Tuesday, January 9 at 7 pm Conference Room

Howard Thurman's theology and ministry have played a leading role in social justice movements and organizations throughout the 20th and 21st centuries. He was one of the principal architects of the modern nonviolent movement for civil rights and a key mentor to the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., who reported carried a copy of Jesus and the Disinherited throughout the Montgomery bus boycott. As our world and churches continue to struggle with issues related to poverty, white supremacy, anger, and distrust, all are welcome to read and join together for a discussion of this important and influential book.

Wholehearted Faith by Rachel Held Evans with Jeff Chu Tuesday, February 13 at 7 pm Conference Room

At the time of her death in 2019, at the age of 37, Rachel Held Evans was recognized widely for her theologically astute, profoundly honest, and beautifully personal books which have guided, edified, and helped to shape countless Christians as they seek to live a just and loving faith. Wholehearted Faith is the book she was working on at the time of her death; in it, the author wrestles with God's grace and love, looks unsparingly at what the church is and does, and explores universal human questions about becoming and belonging.

The Peace Light from Bethlehem Arrives in Kent

The Peace Light is a continuous flame originating in the grotto of Jesus' birth in Bethlehem. It is shared person to person throughout the world with a message of peace and friendship. The Peace Light of Bethlehem, symbolic of the Light of Christ especially evident at Christmas, is meant to promote peace, harmony and unity among all people of the world.

Each year in late November, a child from Austria lights a lantern from the continuously burning candle in the Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem, the site of Jesus' birth. The light, known as the 'Peace Light', stored in special explosion-proof lanterns, is then flown with a safety adviser back to Vienna Austria, where it is shared with delegations from across Europe who distribute it with a message of Peace to their own countries for use at ecumenical services. Scouting organizations then take the light to houses of worship, hospitals, homeless shelters, nursing homes, and places of public, cultural and political importance - to anyone who appreciates the significance of the "gift".

In early December, Austrian Airlines representatives transport the Peace Light from Austria to New York, JFK International Airport. A distribution ceremony is held at the airport's Our Lady of the Skies Chapel to welcome the light of peace. The light's pilgrimage across the U.S. begins from NYC via volunteers, many of whom are Scouts and Scouters associated with the Boy Scouts of America and Girl Scouts of the USA, transferring and sharing it in their communities. Many other volunteers share the Light as it spreads across North America. The Peace Light is a sign of hope. It has expanded from a small flame to a sea of lights and shines with its message to millions of people worldwide.

The Peace Light will arrive in time for the 2023 Christmas season and will be part of our Christmas Eve worship service. If you would like more information about the Peace Light, or how you might get the candle light for your home, contact bobmachovec@kentmethodist.org.

This study is organized into three 8-week modules, each focusing on a different aspect of "covenant"—creating, living, and trusting the covenant—underscoring the unique relationship God chooses with us as God's people. The first module ("Creating the Covenant") was offered this past fall. The second module ("Living the Covenant") will begin on Monday, January 8, at 7 pm in Room 200.
