Lent is our forty-day season of preparing to live as Easter people by worshiping, praying, studying, fasting, and serving. Throughout the season, our scriptures take us into multiple forms of wilderness. We begin on Ash Wednesday, giving attention to the wilderness—the "wild-ness," the inescapable uncertainty—of our mortality: "remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." Then, on the First Sunday in Lent, we join Jesus in the wilderness where the Spirit guides him, where he comes face-to-face with temptation and struggle. But through Jesus' forty days of fasting, resisting, and wandering in the wilderness, he is both sustained and shaped for his ministry. Similarly, through our forty days in the wilderness of Lent, we are invited to surrender to the Spirit who guides us to remember who and whose we are. There is no wilderness that is too harsh or too threatening for God's enduring love.

Our journey through Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, this year on February 14. In our worship together, we are invited into this season of preparing by first acknowledging our limitations,

including our mortality. We are dust, and to dust we shall return. But God's grace is sufficient to receive us, to hold us, and to perfect us in love as we refocus and realign our selves in relationship to God and to each other.

All are welcome to join us in worship in the Sanctuary at noon for an abbreviated worship service or in the Sanctuary or online at 7:30 pm for a worship service including congregational singing, the organ and the choir, and Holy Communion. Both worship services will include the imposition of ashes as a sign of our mortality and our commitment to changing our hearts and lives in partnership with God's grace.

Wholehearted Faith by Rachel Held Evans with Jeff Chu Tuesday, February 13 at 7 pm Conference Room

At the time of her death in 2019, at the age of 37, Rachel Held Evans was recognized widely for her theologically astute, profoundly honest, and beautifully personal books which have guided, edified, and helped to shape countless Christians as they seek to live a just and loving faith. Wholehearted Faith is the book she was working on at the time of her death; in it, the author wrestles with God's grace and love, looks unsparingly at what the church is and does, and explores universal human questions about becoming and belonging.

Caste: The Origins of Our Discontents

In this book published in 2020, Isabel Wilkerson—also author of The Warmth of Other Suns (2011)—offers a masterful portrait of an unseen phenomenon in the United States as she explores, through an immersive, deeply researched narrative and stories about real people, how our country today and throughout its history has been shaped by a hidden caste system, a rigid hierarchy of human rankings. Beautifully written and deeply revealing, Caste is an essential story of people and history and a reexamination of what lies just underneath the surface of ordinary lives in the United States today.

Braiding Sweetgrass: Indigenous Wisdom, Scientific Knowledge, and the Teachings of Plants by Robin Wall Kimmerer Tuesday, April 9 at 7 pm Conference Room

From the author's website:

Drawing on her life as an indigenous scientist, a mother, and a woman, Kimmerer shows how other living beings—asters and goldenrod, strawberries and squash, salamanders, algae, and sweetgrass—offer us gifts and lessons, even if we've forgotten how to hear their voices. In a rich braid of reflections that range from the creation of Turtle Island to the forces that threaten its flourishing today, she circles toward a central argument: that the awakening of a wider ecological consciousness requires the acknowledgment and celebration of our reciprocal relationship with the rest of the living world. For only when we can hear the languages of other beings will we be capable of understanding the generosity of the earth, and learn to give our own gifts in return.

Unnatural Disasters: Creation Care in the Age of Climate Change

As the planet warms around us, causing more frequent and more severe disasters including floods, hurricanes, wildfires, and droughts, how can people of faith be better stewards of God's creation? This series of three documentaries, hosted by the West Ohio and East Ohio Conferences of our United Methodist Church, will take us to places around the country experiencing unnatural disasters in this present age of climate change. 2023 Financial Report United Methodist Church of Kent

As we look back on the past year and all the transitions, our hearts are filled with gratitude for the extraordinary generosity and unwavering support you have shown to and through our church community. Change can be difficult, but your contributions—whether in the form of time, talent, and/or financial gifts—truly have made a profound impact on our ability to fulfill our mission and spread God's message of love and compassion.

In addition to meeting our congregation's operating expenses in full in 2023, we made significant improvements to our building and grounds which support not only our congregation's many ministries but also our broader community through groups who use our facility regularly, including a variety of 12-step groups (e.g. AA, NA, Al-Anon), Kent Friends, Piano Quest, Kent Rotary, Kent Lions, Garden Club of Kent, Scouts, Tree City Preschool, Kids Kare Kent Campus (daycare), and United Christian Ministries (campus ministry). Restrooms were renovated in multiple parts of the building, the roof over the education wing was replaced, signage was updated surrounding the building, and carpets and drapery were professionally cleaned, all through the generosity of memorial gifts and your ongoing support. It is through your generosity that we are able to create warm and welcoming spaces for our community to worship, fellowship, and connect. Thank you!

And your generosity certainly has reached beyond our "walls," as well, as we participated in the larger body of Christ in 2023 by giving more than \$156,000 to support transformative ministries both locally and globally, including:

- \$102,771 to support 101% of our United Methodist Shared Ministry goal;
- \$4,643 on "special giving" Sundays, including Human Relations Day, UMCOR Sunday, Native American Ministries Sunday, Peace with Justice Sunday, World Communion Sunday, and United Methodist Student Day;
- \$17,580 through our Christmas offering to support the home we are building for the Powe family in Ravenna through our partnership in an Apostles' Build with Habitat for Humanity of Portage County;
- \$5,761 through the mission commitments of our United Women in Faith (formerly "UMW") circles;
- \$20,078 to support other UMC-related missions, including Africa University and disaster relief through the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR); and
- \$5,385 to support other local ministry partners including Kent Social Services, Marie Miller House, Freedom House, County Clothing Center, the LGBTQ+ Emergency Fund at KSU, Kevin Coleman Burns Endowment, Heart 4 the City, UH Portage Hospital Chaplaincy, Haven of Rest, and Nehemiah Mission.

Your kindness and generosity strengthen the foundation of our congregation and allow us to continue serving and connecting with our neighbors in meaningful ways. Thank you for your generosity in 2023. And thank you for your ongoing commitments for 2024. Because of your commitments for the coming year, we look forward to continuing and expanding our many ministries. For 2024, you have named financial commitments of \$268,234, which is a 6.3% increase from financial commitments for 2023.

From the bottom of our hearts, we extend our sincerest thanks for your continuing contributions. May the spirit of unity and love that you exemplify continue to guide us on our shared journey of faith.
