### **Diapers for the County Clothing Center**

Almost thirty years ago, the County Clothing Center began with a group of volunteers distributing free clothing in Pierson Hall once per month. Today, the Center operates out of a permanent location on SR 59 in Ravenna, offering a large variety of clothing in all sizes, colors, and styles for free to whomever needs them. The Center frequently has a need for diapers, especially sizes 3–6, and for wipes, so while we refresh our nursery and toddler rooms in our building, please help us also restock the County Clothing Center with diapers for our neighbors who need them. Donations may be placed throughout the month in the donation bin in the atrium.

### **New 12-Week Bible Study**

The following are a few of the testimonies we shared in worship on 6/29 after this year's trip by our youth:

**Audrey Hinkle:** Every year is a different experience of course with exceptions, but every year I look forward to it, my first year I was so scared to leave home but after the week I was already ready to go back before we even left, I look forward to it I enjoy what we learn making friends and worship. I was put in a YRG ( youth renewal group ) like everyone else but unlike everyone else we all were sent to the mountain for a different reason God has a plan for each and every one of us whether it's on the mountain or off, mountain top has taught me so much about God and if I get the chance to go again no doubt I will go and serve.

**Joseph Lepp:** On Monday and Thursday my team and I had to do yard work for two nice ladies but the job that had the biggest impact on me was our task on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday. On these days we had to build a porch for Mr. Briton who hadn't yet got back from running errands. When we first saw the place we were disgusted. There was trash everywhere and it smelled and because of this we judged Mr. Briton by the outside of his home without knowing his story and how God guided him to this new beginning after being homeless.

After we talked with him we learned about his tough life journey from the military to his many life choices

both good and bad to experiencing homelessness to being able to buy this property to make his own.

His mission for his property is to turn it around inside and out and his first step was through Mountain TOP for the porch and stairs he needed to access his home. Our group fell into the trap of temptation of judging others, but Jesus led us away and into the life of Mr. Briton and all he intends to do with the hope and love he has in the lord.

**Savannah Stephan:** If you know me you know I'm an energetic person, so it was good to put all of my energy into God and helping out in the community. As you know it is extremely hot in Tennessee so when my energy did start to run out God gave us shade. One of my favorite things at Mountain TOP Was free time because it gave me a chance to hang out with my friends and also make new ones. Another thing I enjoyed was morning day break because it gave me an opportunity to sit in a peaceful spot and have one on one time with God and also reflect on past working days. I enjoy going to Mountain TOP so I will be going back next year.

**Allison Hinkle:** Mountain TOP feels like a second home to me. I enjoy meeting kids from all around the country and I also get to grow closer to God too. Mountain top is an example of how we all should live as Christians. With all the work we complete we still have time for God. We have morning devotions and nightly worship. Even in the middle of the work day we take a quick stop to be with the Lord. We can take these lessons and apply them to everyday day life. Not having enough time for God is not an excuse with all we complete we still have time for god and even a little fun. Mountain TOP overall is a good experience, you grow closer to your faith and make good friends along the way. They become your family for a week the same way Mountain TOP is your home for a week and you'll never want to leave once you go.

**Madison Conley:** I felt closer to God the more I helped people and the more I talked to a lot of nice people. On Monday we help a lady with her roof and part of her stairs, there was a lot of cats. We also made Bob (our mascot) and brought us closer together everyday. On Tuesday and Wednesday we helped David paint and scrape his brick house, and he gave up his free time to help us try to finish. We also had a dog and a hen cross the street eyeing our food at lunch. On Thursday we finished a porch roof for the people who didn't finish it. We helped a lady with her garden and yard because she couldn't do it without helpers and she offered us bug spray and water. I also felt closer to God when I served breakfast for others at Mountain TOP. I felt very welcomed and I loved how they had service. I'm planning to go back next year and get another (hook) pin. Another thing that made me feel closer to God is the people's kindness and story's. And it makes me feel happy knowing God brought all these people together.

**Libby Filler:** Mountain TOP was such a fun experience. My YRG (which is the group that we do all of your projects with) was super nice and kind. We had nicknames for everyone in that group, and our driver was always pushing me to do stuff like using power tools. If I had to choose

I would say that my favorite day was Wednesday because we got a DEMO project (which means we get to tear down stuff)!! But every day was super fun. Free time was my favorite part of the day because we got to play 9 square and volleyball and just talk. I also can't forget to mention our end of the day gossip season where what happens on the mountain stays on the mountain. Mountain TOP was so much fun and I am really looking forward to it next year.

## Attention all third graders and their parents


## Mountain T.O.P. Adults in Ministry Trip




### ***The Heaven & Earth Grocery Store: A Novel***

As the story unfolds, it becomes clear how much the people of Chicken Hill must struggle to survive and how damaging bigotry, hypocrisy, and deceit can be to a community. When hard truths are unearthed, McBride shows that it is love and community—heaven and earth—that ultimately sustain us.




### ***Unfit Parent: A Disabled Mother Challenges an Inaccessible World***




## Back to School Blessing and Backpack Tags
